The third cumulative alphabetical catalogue

This third cumulative alphabetical catalogue of IDC's microfiche editions of rare works on Russia/USSR/Eastern Europe is the fruit of thirty years' intensive work in many libraries in various countries and in cooperation with a large number of advisors.

The basis of this work was laid in the Helsinki University Library, where IDC's cameras have been working for many years under the guidance of Prof. Josef Trypućko of Uppsala University, who made a selection of important serials in the Helsinki collections.

The total collection now comprises 1,700 periodicals and serial works, and 8,000 monographs, together amounting to some 70,000 separate volumes.

This collection forms a research library which is a veritable gold mine for researchers in many disciplines. At modest expense, libraries and institutions can become important centres of research in this field.

The contents of the catalogue

The collection listed in this catalogue represents some 22 subject catalogues, most of which are still available separately. These catalogues and the editors responsible for the contents are mentioned below. The specialist can use the subject catalogues to see quickly what is available in his or her field; and this complete cumulative catalogue gives up-to-date information on all material now in stock for immediate delivery.

Akademiia nauk SSSR publications

Because so many of the series and periodicals were published by the *Akademiia*, we have listed such publications under their own title rather than under *Akademiia*, the only exceptions being the two central series, which have been listed under "LENINGRAD. Akademiia Nauk SSR": The *ACTA*, which goes back to 1773 and was continued under different names, and the *ZAPISKI*, which started publication in 1837 and also changed its name frequently.

The quality of IDC microfiches

IDC microfiches are black and white positive prints, always on high quality silver film. Only silver film can satisfy archival standards. Silver film gives superior results, especially for halftone illustrations.

The reduction ratio of IDC microfiches ranges between 14 and 24, depending on the size of the original work and the size of the type. The number of pages on IDC microfiches therefore varies between 60 and 98. These factors, which are taken into consideration for each work to be filmed, and the quality of the prints, guarantee the utmost readability of both text and illustrations.

Available from stock

All listed serials and monographs are immediately available. This list covers our holdings up to September 1989. Work on this project is continuing, so if this catalogue does not contain a title or the volumes you need, please write to us, since we may have filmed them already or are planning to do so.

Single volumes available

Since microfiche editions consist of separate microfiches, it is of course possible to supply single volumes or broken sets. This makes it simple for a library to complete a collection at low cost.

Missing volumes

As with all rare publications, it is sometimes hard to find complete sets even with the help of numerous institutions. We do our best to search for missing volumes, and continually add such volumes with the help of an increasing number of cooperating libraries.

The size of the microfiches

The last number of the IDC order numbers designates the size of the microfiches (e.g. R-7147/1). The following numbers are used:

- /1 for 10.5 x 14.8 cm microfiche
- /2 for 9 x 12 cm microfiche
- /3 for 35 mm microfilm
